Eganville Celebrates 150 Years of Community Volunteerism

There is so much to celebrate this year as Canada turns 150 years old. In the village of Eganville in Renfrew County, the Eganville & District Seniors Association (EDSA) honoured the event in style!

On June 21st, the Summer Solstice, a sizeable crowd gathered on Bonnechere Street in front of the local Bonnechere Museum for the unveiling ceremony of a beautiful black granite bench. Those gathered listened to speeches from key figures, including Pembroke & Petawawa District Community Foundation (PPDCF)'s Dr. Elizabeth Radley-Walters, Renfrew County Warden Jennifer Murphy, Township of North Algona Wilberforce Mayor Deborah Farr, Bonnechere Museum chairperson Preston O'Grady, Rankin Recreation Community secretary Muriel Verch, Council for the Algonquins of Pikwakanagan First Nation's member Wendy Jocko, and the board president of the EDSA Dr. William Enright, all recognizing the importance of volunteer service.

The Eganville and District Seniors has been serving its community for 30 years, and volunteers have always been at the forefront of the success of this organization. Thirty years ago, Marian Foran (founding member of the EDSA) had recognized that the elderly and disabled could use more assistance in their daily lives to stay active within their homes and community. Because of the hard work and dedication of numerous volunteers, the EDSA is a huge asset to seniors and the disabled, by keeping them independent in their homes for as long as possible.

After all the speeches commemorating the community's selfless volunteers, it was time to officially unveil the bench. To do this, a garland of red and white Canadian flags was cut by Marian Foran and Gertrude Berger. Gertrude is the longest-serving active volunteer (27 years). The two women, suitably dressed in red for the occasion, proudly snipped the garland on behalf of all the local volunteers that have served the community over the last 150 years.

This historic bench was possible with thanks to generous funding from the EDSA's annual Volunteer Appreciation and Memorial budgets, and a grant from the Pembroke/Petawawa District Community Foundation (PPDCF) which had been matched by Canada 150 funds. Engraved with

the Canada 150 logo, the EDSA logo and the PPDCF logo, the bench is a stately addition to the community and is situated in a central position in the village. Furthermore, the bench is a symbol of the generous community members who come together to provide for those in need of help and support.

Association of Municipalities Ontario

Many of our County Mayors, Reeves and Councillors attended the Association of Municipalities of Ontario Conference (AMO) held in Ottawa in mid August. Warden/Mayor Murphy represented us through the Eastern Ontario Wardens' Caucus (EOWC) at delegations with the PC Caucus, the NDP caucus and the Liberal Government to address concerns regarding new potential legislation and opportunities. Earlier this year, the EOWC agreed on three priorities including the broadband/cellular gap, infrastructure shortfalls and mounting costs that are making our municipalities more and more difficult to budget for. The four additional items that the EOWC spoke to at the AMO conference were the potential of a 1% HST increase, the increasing need for Provincial Gas Tax funds to also be allocated to those of us with no public transit, the proposed Fire-Medic initiative and the OMB Reform.

As reported, none of the three parties are planning to increase the HST. The proposal of the Gas Tax was well received and we were given some ideas about transit in our communities, such as medical appointment transport, which could qualify us for some of this fund. The EOWC and AMO are not in favour of the Fire-Medic program, however we were given the assurance that this would be a decision made by each municipality. The EOWC and AMO are also concerned about the appeal process under the proposed OMB Reform.

Eastern Ontario Regional Network

The Eastern Ontario Regional Network (EORN) continues to work on the broadband/cellular network gaps and funding opportunities to ensure that we have similar service to urban areas. In May 2017, EORN submitted an application to the Federal Government to partially fund this initiative. This would be a shared cost between the Federal and Provincial Governments and the Counties/Municipalities that are part of the Eastern Ontario Wardens' Caucus. EORN and EOWC continue to advocate and lobby for funding for areas where we are not served or underserved.


Eganville Arena Renovations

Few things last forever and at 50 years old our area was in need of some surgery. Despite living a healthy life and taking care, some things were just worn out with age. The ice surface was badly cracked and the circulation system used for freezing, was leaky and corroded. Other systems needed to be updated as well. Facing over a million dollars in must do repairs we started to apply for grants and lobby any minis-

try willing to listen. We were fortunate to have the assistance of the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport through the Ontario 150 - Community Capital Program administered by the Ontario Trillium Foundation. This grant in the amount of \$445,000 would help us undertake this project. This was their single largest grant for this sort of project this year. With the paperwork signed in January, we began the process of engineering work.

Originally this large project was scheduled to be completed in time for the hockey and skating season. However, after the tenders came in, the schedule of work increased from the projections by

three weeks causing a disruption to the start of the ice season.



We thank everyone who is being inconvenienced for their patience and understanding. Also a big thank you to our neighbours for their generosity in providing ice time. That said, we are making every effort to get this job done as early as possible and there may be some good news in a few weeks.

We are grateful to be making these improvements which will see our arena servicing the community for another 50 years!

Fire Department Message

Fall is just around the corner, and along with it cooler temperatures will arrive. It is time to start thinking about wood stove/furnace/appliance maintenance. Please ensure that a qualified technician inspects and cleans your fuel burning appliances and chimneys at least once a year. Always burn clean, dry and quality wood in your woodstove or furnace.

Please remember that along with mandatory smoke alarms, all residences (home, cottage, etc.) that burn solid fuels are legally required to have carbon monoxide alarms installed. Along with wood, pellets, and coal, the solid fuel category is also comprised of liquids such as natural gas, propane, and oil. Burning is also not restricted to heat. It also includes oil/natural gas propane cook stoves, washers and dryers, and hot water tanks.

The Bonnechere Valley Fire Department would again, like to remind you, that we are available for free home fire safety inspections. We will assess fire safety and ensure your smoke and CO alarms are current, working and in the correct places in your home or cottage. Please contact the Township for an appointment.
