Flood Relief and Flood Clean-Up

The Flood of 2017 will have some lasting effects for many of our residents and Bonnechere Valley is helping with the cleanup. If you have debris that washed ashore or brush, damaged construction materials, appliances or other debris from your flood affected property you can bring it to either of two locations, *free of charge* between now and the end of June. It needs to be separated and placed in the proper areas of the Ruby Road waste transfer site or the Sno Drifter's construction and demolition site. Signs on those sites and the attendant will be available to guide you to the proper location at both sites. For those residents requiring help with the transportation of debris due to age or disability please call the Emergency Management Coordinator (Steve Fiegen) and an appointment will be set for July 8th and 9th.

The County of Renfrew Health Unit and the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry do not recommend emptying sandbags onto your beach or places where children play because of possible contamination of the sand from the flood waters. The Township will pick up unwanted sandbags on one weekend near the end of June (date to be announced). On the pickup date, unwanted sandbags are to be placed in a convenient location near the end of your driveway. Residents wishing sand bags to be picked up are to contact the Emergency Management Coordinator prior to the 23rd of June for pickup on June 24th and 25th.

Household garbage must still be bagged and paid for in the usual way and household hazardous waste must go directly to the Sand Road Household Hazardous Waste Depot.

You should also contact your local property owner's association if you live on Golden Lake or Lake Clear to report of look for any lost and found items. For folks on the Bonnechere River and Constant Lake the township will maintain a Lost & Found webpage at bonnecherevalleytwp.ca/lostandfound. Contact danaj@eganville.com to report a found item.

Expecting the Unexpected

Each season brings with it something new for drivers. Habits need to be adjusted and our minds refocused as we head down our highways and country roads. There are other forms of transportation with a legal right to use those roadways and as an operator of a vehicle with the weight, speed and power to do the most harm, it is the driver's responsibility to be alert and careful at all times. Even if you are in the right legally, any harm you may cause will always be with you. Here are some things to watch out for this summer season:

Bicycles are considered vehicles under the law and have every right to be on the road. They should stay to the right as far as possible but sometimes they cannot due to cracks and potholes that would cause them to have an accident. They are not required to ride on unpaved shoulders and there are good reasons for them to stay on the pavement. Slow down when approaching one and stay 1 metre or more away from them when you pass. If you come upon one on a blind hill or curve you need to slow down and pass only when it is safe to do so.



People of all ages walk, jog, run and cross our roadways. Some are even walking dogs while other may be pushing strollers. They have every right to be there. They are required to stay on the shoulder but may not be able to do so for a variety of reasons. Again, slow down and try to anticipate the unexpected.

Horse drawn carriages and wagons also have a right to the road just the same as you do. They can and do occupy a full lane. You are required to slow down, stop if necessary, and wait until it is safe to pass them.

Added to all of the above are the various farm and construction vehicles that also need to use our roads. You never know what might be over that next hill or around the next curve, so slow down, stay alert and have some patience. Life is short enough and we all need to do our part to not make it any shorter.

ONE MORE THING: Everyone who uses the roadways has rights and responsibilities. You cannot accept the rights and reject the responsibilities that come with them.

Bicyclists: While the law gives you the right to be in a lane, that same law says that slower traffic must stay to the right. You also need a white reflector on the front and a red one on the back of your bicycle (lights are required after dark). A bell or horn is also required as is a helmet if you are under 18 and a really good idea for everyone! Bright or reflective clothing is not required by law but it makes you more likely to be seen and it may save your skin. Remember a two ton truck versus a 150 pounds of bike and rider is no contest at all.

People on foot should travel facing traffic and stay on sidewalks and shoulders whenever possible. Highly visible clothing is a good idea as well and dogs need to be on a short leash when walking near traffic.

Household Hazardous Waste Depot Now Open

People in Bonnechere Valley now have a place to dispose of those items that should never go into your household garbage. Last year we established a household hazardous waste depot at our Sand Road waste transfer station. It is open from the May Long Weekend through to Thanksgiving Weekend. Household chemicals, oils, batteries, fluorescent bulbs, cleaners, paints and more will be accepted for safe disposal during all hours that site is open. Only household quantities are accepted (20 litre or smaller containers).

BBQ Safety Tips

Taking Your Barbecue Out of Storage

Inspection

- * Check for a propane leak by brushing a mixture of 50% liquid soap and 50% water over your cylinder's open valve. If bubbles appear, you have a leak.
- * Check for worn or rusted fittings, flex hoses and burners and replace any necessary parts.

Cleaning

- * Use a flexible brush to clear build up form insect nests and other debris from the tubes running from the propane valve to the burner to mitigate the risk of a fire.
- * Make sure to clean your BBQ's grease trap regularly as excessive build up can cause fires.

Lighting Your Barbecue

Switching On

- * The lid of your BBQ should always be open before lighting.
- * Turn of your propane cylinder first to open up the gas supply. Next, turn on your burner and immediately use the igniter switch.

Switching Off

- When finishing with the BBQ, shut off your propane cylinder first to close off the gas supply.
- Next, close off the burner control valves and make sure the grill is completely cooled off before covering it.

Important Everyday Practices

Safe Use

- * Be sure you never leave your BBQ unattended while grilling.
- * If your flame goes out while BBQing, turn off your burner and propane and wait at least 15 minutes before relighting it.

Storage

- * Always use and store your BBQ outdoors, upright in a secure and will ventilated area at least 3 metres(10 feet) away from sources of heat or ignition and clear of your home.
- * Propane cylinders should be disconnected at the end of the season and stored in a she away form the home. Spare cylinders should be stored the same way throughout the BBQ season.

Look for them to appear this summer on Lake Clear Road, Buelow Road and Wieland Shore Road. Depending upon how they work out they may appear on other roads over time. They will be designed in a way to not hinder winter snow removal or cause problems for low ground clearance vehicles. They should only present a problem for folks traveling far faster than they should and may save lives and money. Policing costs make up a major part of our property taxes and these efforts are designed to help lower those costs.
